Safety Minute

Greetings from Grand Lake! I want to tell you about a recent weekend excursion my family and I took to Bear's Den Resort over in Grove. We took the 5 kids, motorhome, and sea doo and had a very exhausting/relaxing weekend. Work hard, play hard..... right?

Anyway, we had the sea doo out and I was towing my two oldest girls on a two man inner tube and I noticed a burning smell. I looked around at the machinery beneath me (obviously not wanting to be riding a flame thrower). Everything was fine on my end.

I still smelled the odor quite strong and looked up towards Sail Boat Bridge and in the distance I saw a boat floating about with smoke and flames billowing out of the stern. Immediately I throttled the watercraft over to the boat in distress. I kept my two passengers on the tube at a safe distance.

As I approached I could see that the driver was attempting to extinguish the flames with a water soaked life vest. I opened the front compartment of our sea doo, grabbed the plastic tub that holds equipment, and threw it into the boat. We kept dowsing the fire with water from the lake and it seemed to be helping.

By this time there were large flames coming from the engine belts, wood floor, and the fuel line was now on fire.



I noticed that when I threw the tub into the boat my fire extinguisher had been ejected into the middle section of the boat. It was old, and I had actually not inspected it probably ever. Luckily it had just enough life in it to put the fire out.

I set my tube passengers afloat and hooked on to the boat and towed it over to the boat ramp and pulled it out on a trailer.

I went back over to where I abandoned my passengers and met them on the beach as they were able to swim themselves and the tube back to our campsite area. I found out later that my girls were not impressed by the vision of their dad and a burning boat in the same frame.

I just can't imagine what that guy would have done if no one had been there to assist him. There's no way he could have put out that fire with only a damp life jacket. He was burned on his legs and arms. At the very least we could have gotten him away from the boat and watched it explode and burn down to the water line.



We got lucky and were able to save everything -- this time. I keep thinking about how much I have taken for granted safety equipment. Oh sure, "I'll never need it". Well it saved that guys life today!

That guy is someone's Dad, Brother, or son. That's the reason I felt compelled to tell you my experience. I care about our organization and what it has brought to me and my family. You all are my family as well, and I just want to say, "CHECK YOUR FIRE EXTINGUISHERS!"

I will be implementing some sort of safety dialog into our meetings when we start up this year no doubt!

Jamboree on the Air October 16-18, 2009

Jamboree-on-the-Air is an annual Scouting and amateur radio event sponsored by the World Scouting Bureau of the World Organization of the Scout Movement. Thousands of amateur radio stations around the world participate.



The 52nd annual Jamboree-on-the-Air will allow more than 500,000 Scouts from around the world to exchange experiences and share ideas by making contact through amateur radio.

The event is an official Jamboree, so it contributes to the world brotherhood of Scouting by promoting communications and understanding among Scouts from all over the world. Individual Scout units can operate on the air for any part of the 48-hour weekend event.

JOTA welcomes participation by Scouting and amateur radio enthusiasts of all ages – Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts, Venturers, Girl Scouts, and Scouters.

JOTA is traditionally held the third weekend in October, and this year will be no exception. The event will begin on Friday, October 16, at 22:00 local time and will end on Sunday, October 18, at 23:59 local time.

Patches are available. JOTA cards for recording contacts are also available.

Jamboree on the Internet October 17-18, 2009

The World Scout Jamboree on the Internet (JOTI) is an international Scout Meeting on the Internet which takes places every year on the third weekend of October.

This is an official event of the World Organization of the Scout Movement.



During that weekend, thousands of Scouts from all over the world meet and communicate with each other over the Internet, using any technologies locally available, from web browsers to e-mail, chat programs, microphones, scanners and digital cameras. Scout groups can combine this event with the Jamboree On The Air (JOTA), an event where Scouts can communicate with each other over radio amateur frequencies with the assistance of a local radio amateur crew.

Most of the communication takes place over E-mail and in a chat network called IRC, the Internet Relay Chat. JOTI allows you to build friendships with Scouts in other countries and to find out more about their civil and scouting life. Often, these contacts last for years and build the base for upcoming group trips and enterprises.

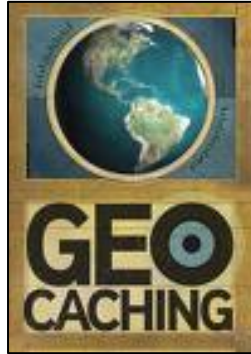
Geocaching October 24, 2009

BSA Centennial Set Orders Accepted

Orders for the 100th BSA anniversary Cherokee Area Council centennial sets are now being accepted at the Scout Office. Flyers are available at the Scout Office and on the Council web site. All fourteen items that are contained in the set are noted on the flyer. Only 66 sets are being created, so be sure to get your order in early before they sell out!

A Frankoma plate with the Csatari "After Hours" painting is something new for this set. The picture has the Cherokee Area Council shoulder patch on the Scoutmaster, which was modeled after James Tarr's Scoutmastership in Bartlesville Troop 1.



Another different item is the Council 6-inch round backpatch. Another special item is the postal cachet from the Pawhuska 1st Troop Historic Trails Camporee this past July. When the set is purchased, buyers can

either select one of the two council posters noted, or get both for an extra \$20.

The other items in the set are ten different Council Shoulder Patches (CSPs), most of which are available only through purchase of the sets.

- ▶ The centennial CSPs for 2008, 2009, and 2010 are being produced in a special silver mylar border edition just for the sets.
- ▶ The current 2010 CSP is also included with green border and a white ghosted version as well.
- ▶ A James Tarr commemorative CSP is produced with silver mylar border and red ghosted version.
- ▶ Our Council Philmont treks have a trek patch with silver thread border which is included, and a silver mylar border is available only in the sets along with a blue ghosted version. The Philmont trek CSPs honor John Westfall who wrote the hymn for Philmont, with the words to the hymn being the inspiration for the patch design.

Sets will be available for delivery in the first half of October. Proceeds from the sale of these sets directly help the Council, so you are supporting our local Scouting program when buying the sets.

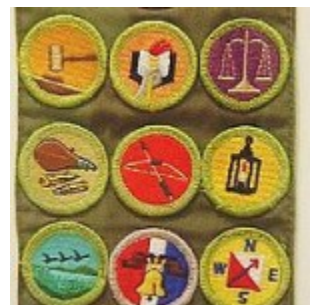
The price of the sets is \$125 each. These sets provide a look back into our history and a look forward to continue the Scouting journey.

GPS/GIS merit badge approved. Requirements under development. Debut expected early 2010.

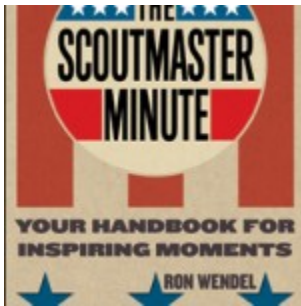


Scouting Heritage merit badge has been approved. Requirements under development. Debut expected later this year.

The Scoutmaster Minute: Your Handbook For Inspiring Moments

The book *The Scoutmaster Minute* by Ron Wendel is subtitled “Your handbook for inspiring moments”. The first thing you notice is that the subtitle seems pretty accurate. It’s a tiny book size that easily fits into a pants pocket. The 128 pages are

filled with 155 short stories, poems, and historical references that can be delivered to boys by the Scoutmaster during his allowed 60 seconds at the end of a troop meeting. Most won’t require a full minute to relay and that should make any Scoutmaster using this reference more popular with his troop.

The organization of the book is by Scout Law. The first part is character encompassing trustworthy and loyal. The next is mind: obedient and cheerful. Body covers thrifty and clean. Spirit relates to brave and reverent. The final section handles the laws helpful, friendly, courteous, and kind.

I wouldn’t recommend trying to read the whole thing from front to back unless you like to pick it up at your odd free moment. There are a lot of great anecdotes, but I found trying to go from front to back without a story is difficult. Besides, there are things you read and then want to stop and think about for a bit.

All of the last three Scoutmasters for my troop directly referenced the Scout Law in their Scoutmaster Minutes quite frequently. This makes the organization very natural to most users.

Parents, also, will find the book a handy reference if they are reinforcing the Scout Law in their family code of conduct. I imagine that this is also a convenient source for counselors and leaders of all sorts in Boy Scouts: Assistant Scoutmasters lending a story to the campfire, camp counselors trying to find an engaging way to make

a point, and troop committee members trying to remind each other why they are giving up a little more than the fabled hour a week.

Ron Wendel’s favorite source of stories and poems seems to be the 18th and 19th centuries, especially American forefathers, but he has references from Shakespeare and the modern biography of Pat Tillman, as well. I’ll have to admit that I’m not a big fan of poems for teachable moments because by nature they seem to be open to interpretation. Frank Crane’s “Help Wanted” list is one of those trying to show the ideal boy, but is a little confusing in the attempt. Another mild criticism is that the copy I had from Gibbs Smith, the publisher, had a few pages with smudged print. If you’re a stickler for perfection this detail will annoy you, but if you’re using this as a pocket guide as appears to be the intention, your copy should be well worn and smudged from frequent use anyway.

The list price for this book is \$7.99. Internet distributors have used copies available for less and there is even a version for the Kindle. An interesting bit of trivia for me is that this publisher is the same one from whom I purchased “101 Things to Do with Ramen Noodles”.

If you like the concept of parables and historical references to inspire and teach you’ll love *The Scoutmaster Minute*. If you hate trying to find a website for your Scoutmaster Minute as you’re running out the door to the meeting you’ll find this pocket guide very convenient. If you know that giving an inspirational closing is important, but you doubt your ability to pen a stirring speech, let Ron Wendel do it for you.

New Boy Scout Handbook Is 21st Century Guide for Life

The Centennial Edition of the Boy Scout Handbook unveiled by the Boy Scouts of America (BSA) prepares the 21st century Scout for new technology while celebrating the organization's rich heritage. The 475-page paperback features nostalgic illustrations from the previous 11 editions alongside references to emerging technology and expanded online information.

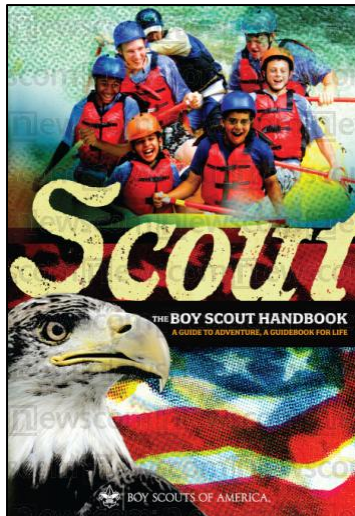
Touted by some Scouts as the ultimate adventure manual, the 12th edition Handbook teaches preparedness and responsibility in both traditional and new ways: think compass and GPS devices, tying a knot as well as a necktie, and first aid and Internet safety. For the first time, the printed Handbook is accompanied by an online site, www.bsahandbook.org, which contains expanded content and illustrations on handbook topics and advancement requirements.

"The Handbook – like our organization – adopts new and modern methods while maintaining the message of preparedness, responsibility and self-reliance," said

Boy Scouts of America Chief Scout Executive Robert Mazzuca. "Earlier Scouts earned merit badges in bee farming, blacksmithing, and signaling, but now our Scouts work on 21st century subjects like composite materials, nuclear science, and oceanography."

Other features of the 12th edition Boy Scout Handbook include:

- A first-ever iPhone application of the iconic guide available in September
- 100-percent recycled paper printed using environmentally friendly processes, creating the first-ever "green" edition



- Tips on long-term personal financial management and budgeting
- Expanded sections on nutrition and physical fitness
- Updated information on bullying, hazing, physical violence, and avoiding Internet dangers
- A nostalgic look of past handbooks with 21st century technology
- A Spanish version will be available in December

The 12th edition Handbook was written by Robert Birkby, an Eagle Scout and former conservation director at Philmont Scout Ranch in New Mexico. Birkby also authored the previous two editions and the BSA Fieldbook. A lifelong Scouting and outdoor enthusiast, Birkby has traveled the world on mountaineering expeditions and backpacking adventures. Birkby is a respected outdoor leader, writer, and expert in trail construction and maintenance. He is also the author of *Lightly on the Land* and *Mountain Madness*.

In celebration of the BSA's centennial, the new edition of the Handbook models the first edition in its three main categories:

- ▶ Scoutcraft –Preparing for Scouting's adventures and for life
- ▶ Woodcraft –Understanding, appreciating, and caring for nature
- ▶ Campcraft –Learning skills useful along the trail, in camp, and beyond
